

Major Project Component Completed in FY25



Lake Jackson Greenway Phase 1

Phase I of the Lake Jackson Greenway creates a multimodal connection between Lake Ella and the Trousdell Aquatic & Gymnastics Center. This segment combines sidewalks and on-street cycle routes to improve safety and access. New sidewalks were constructed along Glenview Drive and within a recreational easement adjacent to the Canterfield Assisted Living Facility. This project enhances walkability for nearby neighborhoods while expanding connectivity to key recreational destinations.

Northeast Park

On October 16, 2024, a new milestone was reached for Tallahassee-Leon County as the Blueprint Intergovernmental Agency, alongside Leon County Government and City of Tallahassee, enthusiastically hosted the groundbreaking ceremony for Northeast Park. City and County leaders, community members, and dedicated staff gathered to celebrate the expansion of our community's vibrant park system. Designed to offer a diverse mix of active and passive recreational facilities, Northeast Park addresses the community's evolving needs. This investment provides valuable green space to promote health and wellness and will serve as a cherished recreational asset for generations to come.

"Community input was central to the Park's design, ensuring that it reflects the desires of local residents, from playgrounds and team sports facilities to picnic areas and walking paths," said **Blueprint Director Autumn Calder.**





Orange-Meridian Community Park

On May 8, 2025, the Blueprint Intergovernmental Agency, the City of Tallahassee and Leon County Government, broke ground on Orange-Meridian Community Park. City and County leaders, dedicated staff, members of the media, and local residents gathered to celebrate the beginning of a dynamic new gathering space for the southside. Designed with input from the surrounding neighborhoods, Orange-Meridian Community Park represents a notable accomplishment in the ongoing investment aimed at enhancing quality of life and community connectivity throughout Tallahassee-Leon County's southside.

Projects Underway



Animal Services Center

- Provides renovations to the existing center to promote animal health and wellbeing. Facility upgrades include:
 - Large-scale dog kennel renovations
 - Shelter medicine area renovations
 - Addition of new outdoor dog yards



- Creating a new community park offering a range of amenities catering to diverse interests.
- Improving pedestrian safety and connectivity throughout the Market District.



- Leveraging opportunity between the City of Tallahassee and Blueprint.
- Constructing a trail along Tram Road from Capital Circle SE to Four Oaks Blvd.







- Creating safe and comfortable streets for pedestrians, transit users and cyclists along the South Monroe-South Adams corridor.
- Five streets connecting the Monroe Street and Adams Street corridors will be improved: Harrison Street, Pershing Street, Jennings Street, Perkins Street, and Kestner Street



- Enhances the 4-mile Bannerman Road corridor by widening to four lanes from Quail Common Drive to Preservation Road.
- Improves safety and enhances mobility by adding a median to accommodate turn lanes from Quail Common Drive to Meridian Road.
- Provides 9 miles of new multiuse trail facilities along Bannerman Road, Orchard Pond Parkway, and Meridian Road.
- Improves accessibility and safety for people walking and biking by constructing two neighborhood sidewalk projects along Tekesta Drive and northern Bull Headley Road.

- Constructs a new shared-use trail from South Adams to Apalachee Parkway to provide connectivity and improve safety.
- Provides underground electric utilities from Chowkeebin Nene to S. Monroe Street, and upgrades sewer utilities.



- Collaborative project with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT).
- Signage, art, landscaping, crosswalks and pedestrian enhancements.
- · Landscaped median project in progress.



- Completing the last phase (5.8 miles) of improvements to the Capital Circle Corridor.

- Creates a new gateway into northeast Tallahassee-Leon County by extending Welaunee Boulevard to Roberts Road
- Provides a new 6-mile roadway that will improve regional mobility, enhance connectivity, and protect canopy roads by reducing transportation pressures on existing roadways.
- Supports enhanced safety and connectivity to Roberts Elementary and Montford Middle schools by constructing the Pimlico extension.
- Constructs a new 8-mile Welaunee Greenway to create a 17-mile greenway loop by connecting to the existing Miccosukee Greenway.
- · Provides a new roadway accessing the 50-acre Northeast Park, currently under construction.



- Completes the 4.25-mile Capital Cascades Trail project linking Leon High School in Downtown Tallahassee to Lake Henrietta.
- Provides connectivity, water quality, stormwater, and recreational improvements from the convergence of the Central Drainage Ditch and the St. Augustine Branch near Lake Bradford Road to Munson Slough at Springhill Road.
- Constructs new sidewalks to connect the Bond neighborhood to the regional St. Marks Trail.
- Provides a new community space along the corridor near the Callen and Bond neighborhoods and Pineview Elementary.
- · Improves water quality through sediment and trash removal in the Central Drainage Ditch.





Shaping a safer, stronger, connected



Provides seamless connectivity between Tallahassee State College, the FAMU- FSU College of Engineering, the FSU Southwest RecPlex, Mabry Park, and nearby neighborhoods through approximately six miles of greenway trails.



Lake Jackson Greenway Phase 2

• Creating a connection and providing improvements north from the Trousdell Aquatic & Gymnastic Center to the Lake Jackson Mounds Archaeological State Park.



Northwest Connector Corridor

- Improving Tharpe Street from Ocala Road to Capital Circle Northwest.
- · Improves access to old Bainbridge County Park near Tower Road and Stoneler Road County Park.
- Adding approximately 9 miles of trail and sidewalk connectivity.









- · Creating safer biking connections along Lake Bradford Road, Springhill Road, and Orange Avenue linking neighborhoods to FSU, FAMU, and Innovation Park.
- Improving road and pedestrian safety by widening shoulders, dedicated bike lanes, and shared-lane markings.



· Providing a 2.5-mile protected bike lane running along West Pensacola Street from Tallahassee City Hall to Florida State University, then back downtown along St. Augustine and West Madison Streets, and South Adams to the Capital Cascades Trail.











Tallahassee-Leon County



- A component of the Lake Lafayette and St. Marks Regional Linear Park project creating a new connection between the Buck Lake Road Corridor and Upper Lake Lafayette.
- Providing a natural setting for walking, relaxing, and wildlife viewing, and features an observation deck for visitors to enjoy the area's scenic beauty.



Ridge Road Trail

- Creating better connectivity along Ridge Road connecting surrounding neighborhoods to the St. Marks Trail, Lake Henrietta, and Siver Lake Park.
- Adding new crosswalks, sharrows, and signage to improve road safety for all pedestrian and transit users.




- Provides funding to construct improvements to the 107-acre Fairgrounds property.
- Constructs a new community building with meeting space and restrooms and improves parking around Gene Cox Stadium.
- Enhances the Capital Park complex and facilities and constructs new stormwater ponds with walking paths.









- Creating a new walking and biking trail nearly two miles long along Blair Stone Road.
- Improving safety, connectivity, and mobility for residents to reach surrounding parks and neighborhoods.
- Connecting to other bike lanes, sidewalk, and paths forming more than 14 miles of continuous routes across Tallahassee-Leon County.



- Creates a multi-modal gateway from Tallahassee International Airport to Downtown.
- Provides 7 miles of roadway safety improvements and over 13 miles of new or improved multimodal facilities.
- Constructs a new roadway to Innovation Park and FAMU + FSU's southwest campus as well as new sidewalks, trails, and bicycle lanes to improve travel in southwest Leon County.
- Supports high-tech sector growth and improves access to Innovation Park and the world-class National High Magnetic Laboratory.




Community Engagement

The Office of Economic Vitality (OEV) is the principal economic development organization for the City of Tallahassee and Leon County, responsible for driving economic growth and development in the region.

Mission

To lead Tallahassee-Leon County's economic development efforts by leveraging existing resources and assets that grow and drive economic vitality.

Vision

To drive the growth of Tallahassee-Leon County's diverse and vibrant economy.

History

In November 2014, sixty-five percent of voters elected to extend the one-cent sales tax through 2039. For the first time in the tax's history, twelve percent—or over \$90 million—of the proceeds were allocated to economic development. These funds support a range of initiatives aimed at strengthening the local economy, including job creation, business recruitment and retention, workforce development, support for small businesses, community engagement, strategic partnerships, and innovative programs that drive long-term, sustainable growth.

2025 IEDC Excellence in Economic Development Awards

In 2025, the International Economic
Development Council (IEDC) honored
Tallahassee-Leon County with two international
Excellence Awards, recognizing our
commitment to inclusive growth and strategic
redevelopment. These awards highlight OEV's
role in advancing equitable development and
shaping a resilient, forward-looking economy.

SoMo Walls, a vibrant mixed-use project located in the South Monroe corridor, received the Gold Excellence Award in Real Estate Development & Reuse for its innovative approach to placemaking and community revitalization.



The Black Business Expo Tallahassee was awarded the Bronze Excellence Award for Economic Equity & Inclusion. This annual event strengthens the region's entrepreneurial ecosystem by creating meaningful opportunities for small businesses.




Tallahassee-Leon County Climbs National Rankings for Job Growth and Economic Strength

The 2024 Leading Metro Locations report published by Area Development magazine highlighted the Tallahassee-Leon County Metropolitan Statistical Area's (MSA) continued economic strength and competitiveness. The rankings—which evaluated 410 metro areas across the nation based on key economic indicators such as job growth, business climate, and workforce development—reaffirm Tallahassee-Leon County's position as one of the top-performing regions in the United States:

#2 in the South Atlantic Region #3 Small Metro Location #4 Overall Metro Location #12 in Economic Strength #13 in Prime Workforce

This recognition underscores our area's ongoing economic vitality, investment appeal, and ability to attract and retain businesses.



Tallahassee-Leon County Among Top 15 Metros Nationally for Black-Owned Businesses

According to the 2023 Annual Business Survey (ABS) published in December 2024 by the U.S. Census Bureau, the Tallahassee Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) ranks #14 nationally for the highest percentage of Black-owned businesses. The ABS, which reflects data from 2022, found approximately 7,828 employer firms in the Tallahassee MSA, of which 549 (7%) were Black or African American-owned. This figure is twice the national average, highlighting Tallahassee-Leon County's commitment to fostering Black entrepreneurship.



Business Development & Intelligence Highlights

IGNITE Tallahassee Open House

In October 2024, we celebrated the IGNITE (Inspiring the Generation of New Ideas and Translational Excellence) Tallahassee Open House event. This advanced science and technology incubator can fast-track innovation and commercialization for up to 100 startups. It features state-of-the-art facilities, including 31 wet and dry labs, 20 offices, coworking spaces, conference rooms, and a sophisticated machine shop for rapid prototyping, all designed to support comprehensive product development.



Strategic Site Inventory Program

Throughout fiscal year 2025, OEV refined and prioritized the locations identified through the Strategic Site Inventory Program to better align with market demand and infrastructure readiness, accelerating commercial and industrial development opportunities. This initiative evaluates each site's development potential based on zoning, utility access, transportation connectivity, and proximity to workforce and amenities. By streamlining the inventory and focusing on high-impact, shovel-ready sites, the program strengthens Tallahassee-Leon County's ability to attract new investment and support business expansion efforts.



Broadband Expansion Throughout Tallahassee-Leon County

OEV continued to lead the Local Broadband Technology Planning Team (LTPT), which works with key community stakeholders to expand high-speed internet access to unserved and underserved areas of Leon County.

Comcast was awarded \$6.5 million to service more than 3,000 households in Leon County's rural areas. The total project costs represent \$15 million in new broadband investment. The project is progressing as planned and is expected to be completed on schedule.

Conexon was awarded \$2.3 million to serve more than 1,300 rural households. The project is progressing as planned and is expected to be completed on schedule.



2025 Motor, Drive Systems, and Magnetics Conference

OEV spearheaded the collaborative effort to bring the Motor, Drive Systems, and Magnetics (MDSM) Conference to Tallahassee-Leon County in February 2025. This effort showcased our region's expertise in magnetics and advanced manufacturing to more than 260 corporate representatives worldwide, resulting in tangible momentum toward future investments and partnerships in the applied sciences sector. Additionally, the event provided a platform for the City of Tallahassee and Florida State University to unveil the largest magnetically levitating sculpture in the world, designed to celebrate Tallahassee-Leon County's bicentennial and designation as the Magnetic Capital of the World.

After a successful 2025 event, the Motor, Drive Systems & Magnetics (MDSM) Conference will return to Tallahassee-Leon County March 3–5, 2026.



Economic Vitality Unplugged Podcast

In May 2025, OEV launched Economic Vitality Unplugged, a dynamic new podcast series that takes a deep dive into the people, projects, and industries powering Tallahassee-Leon County's economy. Each episode features candid conversations with business leaders, entrepreneurs, and innovators working across sectors like advanced manufacturing, technology, real estate, and workforce development. The podcast serves as both an educational resource and a storytelling platform, spotlighting the region's economic momentum and inspiring collaboration across the community.

Talent Development & Attraction

Second Annual North Florida Worlds of Work

In October 2024, OEV sponsored North Florida Worlds of Work (WOW), an event that provides career exploration experience for students in the Big Bend region. Over 2,700 ninth graders participated in WOW, with an additional 350 attendees at WOW Varsity. The WOW Varsity event welcomes students in grades ten to twelve and their parents, guardians, and community members. More than 130 local businesses contributed their time and resources to support WOW, offering hands-on activities and valuable equipment.



2025 Leon Works Expo

OEV connected over 1,000 high school students to skilled workforce opportunities at the 10th annual Leon Works Expo in April 2025. Students from Leon, Wakulla, Gadsden, Jefferson, Calhoun, Madison, and Taylor counties explored high-demand career paths and engaged directly with nearly 80 employers in health, business, information technology, creative, trade, and more.
